worked diligently behind the scenes for more than a decade, assisting the Authority with important administrative work tasks that didn't make the news but were vital to our success," said Authority Chairman

county roads to post the metal easement identifier signs along fences and at entrances to county properties as they were protected by easements. She says she 'put up most of the signs in the county,' and we believe her!" Anderson worked with then Natural Resources Planner

Alison Teetor from 2005 to 2015, first volunteering to help with mailings and moving quickly to on-the-road support. "Prue has always been an amazing volunteer, with

endless energy and a can-do attitude," Teetor said. "That helped her not only get projects done but also made her fun to be around." In accepting the award, Anderson noted, "It's been a

pleasure working with you and I hope to help again soon."
